In the Gospel of John we are told that it was early in the morning on the first day of the week that she went to the place where her dear friend's body had been buried. It was still dark. She found that the giant stone barring the entrance had been moved and his body was no longer present. Mary assumed someone had stolen it and she ran to alert the other followers of Jesus.

It was a hopeless place. Here was the one - many thought he was The One - who had come to free their people. The One who had come to bring hope, healing, liberation. But now he was just like all the others - dead, gone, destroyed. And to add insult to injury, the Empire was not even willing to leave his body in peace. After the state-sponsored execution, their teacher's body was missing. What a horrific scene.

As Mary stood weeping outside the tomb, a stranger approached and asked "Why are you crying?" She thought he was the gardener and immediately began to beg for help, "Sir, if you know where his body is, please tell me!"

The stranger said just one word: "Mary."

Mary - a name that means both "beloved of God" and "bitter." The name of Jesus's mother. The name of more than one of his dear friends. The name of Moses's sister. Beloved and bitter.

When Mary Magdalene heard her name, she suddenly knew. She knew without a doubt that once again love had come. Even to the most hopeless of places. Perhaps especially in the most hopeless of places.

Amen. May it be so.

Palm Sunday Processional, April 9 at 9:30 a.m.

Gather with community members from the other downtown churches at 9:30 a.m. in City Park (near the shelter on Poyntz). We will share in music and process down Poyntz towards our churches. At each stop along the way, we'll share a blessing for the people of that congregation as they peel off to go to their own worship services. There will be no Sunday School that day (nursery care is still available) and our regular worship service will include a palm processional for our children at 10:45 a.m.

“Maundy” comes from the same root as “mandate” and this holy day is the day we remember Jesus’s commandment to love and serve one another. Holy Saturday Paschal Fire, April 15 at Sunset



shorter) take on Holy Saturday at sunset (8:04 pm). Join us as we share in a simple liturgy together, kindle a Paschal Fire in front of the church, and then bring the light into our Sanctuary. We thank the Ministry of the Decorative Scissors for making our Paschal Candle, which will be re-lit throughout the coming year at baptisms and funerals as we remember the promise of God's unending Easter love.

We gather for a potluck breakfast in historic Pioneer-Blachly Halls at 9:30 a.m. That's right. Potluck breakfast. YUM. Bring your favorite quiche, those decadent cinnamon rolls, fruit, or anything else your heart desires.

These individual, group and local efforts are increasingly more important as the President’s budget plans to gut almost a third of the funding for the Environmental Protection Agency, cancel regulations on enhancing fuel efficiency and consider dropping international participation in the Paris Climate Accords. Finally, I hope you all had a chance to read Sean Weston’s eloquent letter to the Mercury last month. He noted that family planning, reproductive health services, and a global concern for sustainable population growth reflect a moral commitment to the common good, not selfishness nor indifference to life. The Grow Green Event is Coming on April 21, 2017

This is the fifth year that the Greater Manhattan Community Foundation (GMCF) has sponsored the Grow Green event. On Friday, April 21, gifts made to the First Congregational UCC account at GMCF will be matched at 50%. That means that if you give \$100, that amount will go into the church's endowed account. The 50% Grow Green match (\$50) would then be available for the church to use immediately, or it could be added to the endowed account. In the past two years, the matches from the Grow Green fund-raising events—totaling \$5,052—has been used to support the church budget, along with annual proceeds of approximately 4% from the endowed account.

The Church's Gifts, Endowments, and Investments Committee has suggested a challenge goal of \$10,000 for this event. If we are successful in achieving this goal, our endowed fund would grow to \$50,000 and the church would receive matching funds of \$5,000 that could be used to support our annual budget.
