Invitation to Summer Spiritual Practices with First Congregational

In the years that I've been at First Congregational, we've often focused on a communal spiritual practice each summer. Again, we “held space” in community – laughing together and swapping stories. Last summer we focused our attention on Keeping Sabbath. Our boards and committees each took a month off and we found breathing space in our shared ministry.

Additionally, I made an intentional shift in how I focused my own time, carving out more space for my own spiritual practices, big dreaming and pondering, Bible study, and more. My guess is that focus on making space for Sabbath will continue in the summer of 2018....and that the Holy Spirit is probably smiling about that.

This summer, the Deacons and I want to present two new options for your consideration. Both are very minimal and flexible time commitments. Both would be a blessing to you. Both would deepen your sense of connection with God. I hope you'll consider participating in one of these spiritual practices with us this summer. If you have any questions, please do reach out!

Prayer Partners: Are you interested in learning to pray, deepening your faith, or connecting more intentionally with someone else at First Congregational? You are encouraged to sign up for a summer Prayer Partner. You and your partner will check in on a weekly basis in-person, via phone, or text. You can simply share prayer concerns with one another or spend time in prayer together. The Deacons will send tips as you begin your partnership so you won't be confused. We will also host an optional kickoff event at 6pm on Wednesday, May 30 for participants. Prayer Partnerships will begin June 1 and wrap up mid-August. **Visit our website (uccmanhattan.org) or contact the church office to sign up by May 21st.**

Weekday Blessings: We would love to send someone from our congregation to pray with you or simply give a brief blessing at your workplace or home during the week. Beginning June 1 there will be an online sign up to reserve your time slot, or you can contact the church office. Vitality News

Vitality Committee Award

On May 9 the First Congregational Church's Vitality Committee will receive the "Faith Into Action" Award from KIFA (Kansas Inter Faith Action) at their annual dinner. The Vitality Committee is being recognized in particular for their work on racism dialogues in Manhattan, Stand with Muslim Neighbors activities and the Underground Railroad Tour.

The keynote speaker this year will be Rev. Kristin Stoneking of Epworth United Methodist Church in Berkeley, California. Rev. Stoneking completed a four year term as executive director of the Fellowship of Reconciliation, the nation's oldest interfaith peace and justice organization, which includes over 60 local chapters and affiliates across the country.

The event will take place at First Christian Church in Topeka on Wednesday, May 9 at 6:30. For tickets see the KIFA website (www.kansasinterfaithaction.org). The Vitality Committee will help arrange carpools to the event.



Cobb Corner — Going Green

“For the fate of animals is the same; as one dies, so dies the other. They all have the same breath, and humans have no advantages over the animals; for all is vanity” – Ecclesiastes, 3: 19-21. The Green Bible.

May 6-12 is Be Kind to Animals Week, though kindness should be a habit not only one week a year. On May 13th the church will have its annual animal blessing in Long’s Park. Hopefully, the potluck that follows the blessing will not include less lucky animals.

Certainly it would be better for the environment. The amount of grain and water needed to produce one pound of hamburger is staggering. The pollution and stench from feedlots, pig farms, and the chicken factories is a growing problem even without consideration of ethics and aesthetics.

If I had to kill the animals I’ve eaten or served to others I suspect I would have become an “opportunistic vegetarian” sooner. Definition: Someone who doesn’t buy or serve meat but who assumes all pepperoni and meatballs to be soy! Many others are probably equally conflicted about leaving the slaughter to others.

Then there’s the cost of meat. We never bought much meat or costly cuts, but not buying meat for the two of us saves at least \$2500 a year. Add the health benefits of avoiding red meat and the calculus for at least reducing consumption of meat becomes still more persuasive.

But there are many other ways to be kind to animals. Taking Purina pet food and other supplies to the church or the Riley County Shelter can be of great assistance. It’s kitten and puppy season at the shelter so please help with your donations, volunteering, or fostering pets. For even more blessings and unconditional love, take home one or two of the inmates!

Food Items: granola bars, breakfast cereal (individual boxes/cups), instant oatmeal (cups/packets), dry soup (packets/cups), ramen, mac & cheese (cups/boxes), peanut butter & cracker packs, cheese & cracker packs, instant coffee singles, hot cocoa packets, koolaid mixes, pasta, dry pasta sauce mixes, crackers, chips (individual bags), rice, dried beans, boxed/bagged rice/noodle/potato dishes, seasoning packets, dry milk, pudding/jello cups, jelly, canned fruit/vegetables, canned pasta sauce, peanut butter.

Personal Items: bar soap, deodorant, wet wipes, razors, shaving cream, laundry soap powder (small boxes), toothpaste, tooth brushes, gloves, stocking hats, hand warmers, tissues, toilet paper, feminine sanitary products, shampoo, lotion, dish soap.

Second Helping is in need of additional church hosts. The church host greets the guests, makes sure people have what they need, and generally monitors the progress of the meal. Volunteers will be paired with an experienced host until they feel comfortable with the position. The church hosts often get to know the guests over time, which is a privilege of the host position. If you would like to serve in this important role, please indicate your name and contact information on the line.

Grounds care in spring, summer, and fall requires mowing the church lawn, in addition to the church garden lot adjacent to the alley, prior to Sunday's worship (Thursday, Friday, or Saturday). In the winter it's a little different. Sign up for a whole week – Monday-Sunday – and if it snows, you "win" what is affectionately called the snow lottery. You've got to clear the walkways with the church snow blower.

Worship volunteers have many Sunday morning tasks. They greet at the door, read scripture, host fellowship hour, usher, contribute flowers, and offer the Word for Children. Sign up is easy!
