Second Helping

Second Helping and other churches that are providing evening meals are experiencing record numbers of guests for our suppers. First Congregational provided meals for 257 in April; last April we served 105. Our supplies are dwindling quickly with these numbers. We have no backlog of granola bars or oatmeal packets; we are buying 5 or 6 boxes of each every week. Please consider bringing some 2nd Helping supplies to fill the 2H pantry! We especially need: granola bars, oatmeal packets, individual helpings of applesauce and other fruit. And come by some Sunday at 6 to have a bite to eat, a glass of tea, and a visit with our guests! Also consider volunteering to help, as kitchen help or co-host. And we're looking for Head Cooks, too (more managing the meal than cooking). As my granddaughter said: "There's this big rush and then it's over. It's so much fun, and you're also helping people with a good meal." —Linda Thurston

Sabbatical Update

We received news in August that we were not awarded the Clergy Renewal Grant that we applied for back in April. This grant would have funded activities for both Pastor Caela and the congregation during her upcoming sabbatical. The process is highly competitive and we want to be sure to thank Dale Stearns and Andrea Chamberlain who worked on our application along with Pastor Caela. Caela's sabbatical will still take place during the summer of 2019 (early May to mid-August). The Cabinet will be working throughout the coming school year to make plans for how we will cover Caela's responsibilities while she is on sabbatical.

More Light and Truth: Understanding our UCC Identity Led by Pastor Sue

Have you ever wondered why we identify our congregation by two names, as “(1) First Congregational Church, (2) United Church of Christ”? How did it happen that we call ourselves Congregational but stipulate that we are part of the UCC? And what does it mean to be



both? That is the central subject of this four-week exploration of the unique story of the United Church of Christ, a denomination formed only sixty years ago as the merger of four separate denominational traditions with roots that date back to colonial America and before. We will look at this history and explore how and why this merger occurred. In addition, we will also examine some of the central aspects of UCC identity, beginning with the fact that, unlike most Christian traditions, we embrace not a theology, but rather multiple theologies.

The Rev. Traci Blackmon to Speak at the KO Annual Gathering

Oct. 12-13 at the Marriot Hotel in Wichita



Executive Minister of Justice & Local Chu./; Ministries for The United Church of Christ and Senior Pastor of Christ The King United Church of Christ in Florissant, MO. In her position as Executive Minister Traci leads the work justice witness ministers and local church ministries. Traci is well known for her compassion and commitment to

those often forgotten and excluded in the halls of power. And she knows the critical role of the church in being a force for justice and compassion.

Initially ordained in the African Methodist Episcopal Church, Rev. Blackmon served in various ministry capacities prior to becoming ordained in the United Church of Christ and installed as the first woman pastor in the 162 year history of Christ The King United Church of Christ.

A featured voice with many regional, national, and international media outlets and a frequent contributor to print publications, Rev. Blackmon's communal leadership and work in the aftermath of the killing of Michael Brown, Jr., in Ferguson, MO has gained her both national and international recognition and audiences from the White House to the Carter Center to the Vatican.



Rev. Blackmon currently resides St. Louis, MO and Cleveland, OH and was named 2017 Citizen the Year by The St. Louis American and as one of St. Louis' 100 most influential voices.

Building Update

It's been a busy year with our Church building. The list below shows some items that the Trustees have been working on this year and also highlights needs in the future. In no way is the list of items below meant to seem overwhelming. It's great that we are in such a wonderful building. As with anything, there is always something to fix, update, or replace.

The budget allows for \$20,000 to be put toward building items each year. With the items that have been completed, or are planned to be complete by the end of the year, we will have exceeded our \$20,000, which will require us to dip into our reserves. We know that the purpose of reserves is to help cover costs that happen from time to time, but this year has been exceptionally costly! Keeping the building in working order means we are also serving the community by hosting meetings and various events 6-7 days a week! If you wish to help replenish some of these funds, please contribute specifically to the Facilities, Environment & Resources Fund (or "Facilities").

Pioneer and Blachly Halls; kitchen, serving area and bathrooms – After a long planning process, the floor to Pioneer Hall was pulled up, structurally reinforced, and leveled to bring it plumb with the floor in Blachly Hall; new carpet was installed, walls and ceilings were repaired and painted in Pioneer and Blachly Halls; new flooring was installed and walls were painted in the kitchen, serving area, and bathrooms. The "Step Forward Campaign" was held and \$43,500 was pledged toward the building updates. Thanks to everyone who generously contributed to this project above and beyond our initial campaign projections! The total for the project was approximately \$43,000.

Window coverings in Blachly and Pioneer Hall – One of the many comments that have been made about the updates is how much more bright the rooms are. More light is due to the window coverings not being reinstalled. After much discussion, it has been decided that a local woodworker, Lowell Regehr, is going to custom build wooden shutters that have louvers that open and close. This leaves many options for how the rooms can be used. The shutters will be able to be opened to get full light in the room, or the louvers can be adjusted as needed to filter the light in or out.

The cost (\$6,600) for the custom shutters is significantly less than bids received for similar products (\$10,000-\$12,000).

Doors – The two front doors and the west side door were replaced earlier this year. Total cost was approximately \$4,400. They will be painted the same shade of red as the other doors once the weather cools.

Roofing – Through an annual roof inspection this spring, it was discovered that all of the flat rubber roofing needs to be replaced. Some active leaks were also found during the Pioneer and Blachly Hall renovation to validate that there is a need for replacement. The shingled parts of the roof were replaced in 2012, but it has been several years since the flat part of the roof was replaced and it has started to deteriorate. Danker Roofing will begin the job in September. The cost of the replacement will be approximately \$17,800. We have applied for tax credits through the Kansas Historical Society which could cover approximately one-third of the costs.

Ice Maker – An ice maker has long been on the list of items requested by those preparing dinners for various events and one was found on clearance at a very good price (\$550). This was installed in the Andover (basement) kitchen. We no longer will need to purchase ice each week for 2nd Helping and for our other events.

Cabinets in the upstairs Sunday School Room and Adult Meeting space – Upper cabinets were donated to the church and installed on one of the walls in the meeting room. Lower cabinets with a new counter top are still needed. The adult meetings that are held numerous time each week will now have places to store some of the items needed for the meetings. Once the lower cabinets are installed, the coffee maker can be stored and used. Costs for unfinished (yep, we're going to finish them ourselves to match the uppers) plus the countertop will be approximately \$300.

Security System – We will be adding a security system to help Sandy and Pastor Caela use a more controlled entry system to the building during the week. This will be very similar to what many other churches are using and will include video/speaker system with a door release button to “buzz” the person in. Bids range from \$4,300 to \$7,300 and a final decision has not been made yet.

Cobb Corner — Going Green

“What we call Man’s power over Nature turns out to be a power exercised by some men over other men with Nature as an instrument”
– C.S.Lewis (1898-1963), I-109, *The Green Bible*.

Lewis clearly anticipated the present era. The last two years have seen a rash rolling back of environmental regulations in the name of economic growth and saving money.

Not figured into the cost equation have been the challenges of climate change, the endangered and burning forests, and the lakes and oceans affected by man-made pollution and red tides. It also does not take account of the shrinking of our national parks at a time of population growth and the dangers to our health and the development of our children by lax food safety and pesticide rules.

This month the trend was resisted when a federal court rejected the Trump administration’s decision to continue supporting Round-Up – the controversial pesticide banned in Europe for its carcinogenic and developmental risks. Moreover, it levied a more than 200-million-dollar fine on its maker, Bayer, for knowing about the dangers for more than a decade while fighting to expand its use.

Lest you think this leaves you with a choice between cancer and crabgrass – not a tough decision I would hope – here’s an alternative to Round-Up that is cheap, easy, and effective:

1 gallon vinegar

2 cups Epsom Salts

1/4 cup of Dawn – the original blue color

Mix, spray in a.m. after dew evaporates. Weeds will be dead by evening.

Second Helping is in need of additional church hosts. The church host greets the guests, makes sure people have what they need, and generally monitors the progress of the meal. Volunteers will be paired with an experienced host until they feel comfortable with the position. The church hosts often get to know the guests over time, which is a privilege of the host position. If you would like to serve in this important role, please indicate your name and contact information on the line.

Grounds care in spring, summer, and fall requires mowing the church lawn, in addition to the church garden lot adjacent to the alley, prior to Sunday's worship (Thursday, Friday, or Saturday). In the winter it's a little different. Sign up for a whole week – Monday-Sunday – and if it snows, you "win" what is affectionately called the snow lottery. You've got to clear the walkways with the church snow blower.

Worship volunteers have many Sunday morning tasks. They greet at the door, read scripture, host fellowship hour, usher, contribute flowers, and offer the Word for Children. Sign up is easy!
