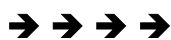

What Shall We Bring?

All these years later, I can still hear the voice of my high school AP English teacher, exhorting us to choose our words carefully in every assignment we turned in: “Don’t tell me. Show me.” It turns out this bit of wisdom it helpful not just for writing, but for living a life.

People are less moved by who we say we are, than who we show ourselves to be. People are less compelled by words about God than they are by an experience of the Holy. People don’t want to hear Christians talk and talk, they want to know that we can walk the walk. If we’re going to have any hope of walking the path Christ has set before us, we need community. We need others to inspire us, encourage us, and extend grace to us when we inevitably fall short.

This past year has been one of serious walking as we have done our best to “be the church” together here in Manhattan. We’ve struggled for justice as a part of the Poor People’s Campaign and provided space for the wider community to better *[continued pg. 2]*

understand immigration issues. We've completed a major renovation project which enables us to continue to offer our building as a community center. We've launched a new kids' yoga program for the wider community while continuing to provide many opportunities for spiritual formation for people of all ages. The Blessing Box offers hospitality 24-7-365 as we prepare to celebrate 20 years of Second Helping.

As your pastor, I have the holy honor of receiving feedback from the wider community about our ministry. When people come to me and say, "I've heard your congregation is welcoming...but is it really okay if I come to worship with my same-sex partner?" I get to tell them "Of course!" and remind them that they are made in God's image. When people come in during the week seeking financial assistance, I get to say, "You're welcome," when they thank us for helping them out of a tough spot. As I come to the building for mid-week meetings, I hear people from our 12 step groups say, "Thank you so much for letting us meet here."

Time and time again, I sit with people who say, "I see the work your church is doing and even though I'm not really a churchy person I just have to tell you, I am so thankful that you are a part of our community." I hear from people who shake their heads and say, "I had no idea there were churches like this."

"Don't tell me. Show me." This is what the wider community - the world - says to those of us who claim to follow Jesus. They don't want to know about our doctrine, they want to see our faith in action. Rooted firmly in God's great love for us, we are freed *for* and compelled *to* action. We are able to take risks and be brave together, knowing that God goes with us. What a gift.

During this month's stewardship campaign, as we ponder the question, "what shall we bring?" let's take time to notice all that this congregation is already bringing to our community and then ask ourselves, "What is my role in ensuring that this is a place where we continue to show our faith rather than just tell others about it?" For we all have a role to play and this congregation is more faith-full when each of us participates in a meaningful way. Thank you for all you do to show God's love to the world around us. It matters more than you know and it is an honor to minister alongside you.

Stewardship Season 2018-2019

Churches and public radio are some of the only places you heard the word "pledge" these days. And "stewardship"? What's that?

As followers of Jesus, we've noticed that there is whole lotta talk about money in the Bible. We feel compelled to take seriously God's call to act as stewards of the resources we have. Stewardship is all about the ways we - as individuals, and as a faith community - use our money, our skills, and our time to be the hands and feet of Christ in our community and our world.

Members of First Congregational are expected to support our shared work together with their prayers, presence, gifts, and service. Part of this support is financial and most of our members make a commitment each year to pledge a certain amount. That pledge helps our church leaders create an annual budget. This process of pondering our pledges and being encouraged to pray and carefully consider what we can each contribute typically happens in the fall each year and we call it the Stewardship Campaign.

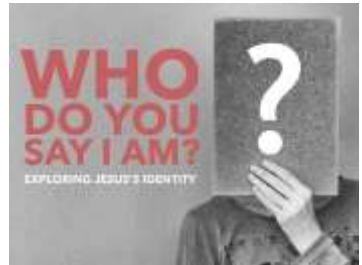
Mid-Week Bible Study – “Who Do You Say I Am?”

Our subject will be the still unresolved question of who the historical Jesus was and how he was understood in his own time. Did his listeners see him primarily as a miracle worker? As a teacher of Wisdom? Was he a prophet of the end times? Or was his message perceived as more political? Was he seen as someone seeking to overthrow the Roman Empire? Bible scholars continue to debate this question and our study will attempt to unravel the question.

We will draw on a number of sources (and even a video or two). I've told a few people who have asked that we won't use a book. But I've reconsidered. To give us a starting place, and, as a way to compare other perspectives, we will read Reza Aslan's book, *The Zealot*. The book is available at Amazon, but if you would like the church to order this book, do let me know.

Cobb Corner — Going Green

*“The growing possibility of our destroying ourselves and the world with our own neglect and excess is tragic and very real.” – Billy Graham, p. I-110, *The Green Bible*.*

Where to start? The environmental and political problems are mounting globally even as our coasts flood with 1000-year floods every couple of years. Yet pollsters tell us that only about one-third of all eligible voters actually vote in the midterm elections.

Why? Too busy? Most if not all states have one-two weeks of advance voting. I like to vote early at the courthouse when there are no lines. I also ask for a paper ballot – no hacking that. Too infirm to vote or will be out of town? Request an advance or absentee ballot. You can fill it out at home and send it in. We once did that from India.

Know a new citizen or a teenager who just turned 18? Explain the process of getting registered and encourage them to vote. Studies show those who are newly eligible are least likely to vote even as they often have the most at stake.

Finally, want something terrifying and haunting to read this Halloween month? Read the new book by Pulitzer Prize-winning author, Chris Hedges, *America: The Farewell Tour*. You won't ever forget his chapter on the environment or on the many other topics he discusses with searing, depressing and well-documented prose. He'll have you voting and praying!!

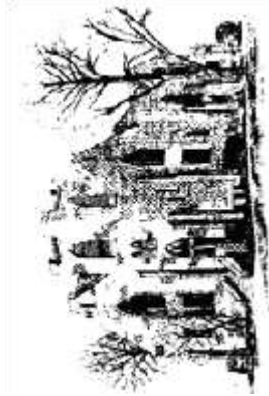
