Caretakers of the Way

On Sunday, Nov. 3rd we will join with Christians around the world in the observance of All Saints Sunday. A time to pause and honor those who lived among us in the flesh and now live in on in our memories, hearts, and spirits. Every single one of us will love and lose someone during the course of our lives. Most of us have had the experience of smiling through tears as we recount what we've learned from the saints who went before us, teaching us how to live faithful and loving lives.

Grief is a funny thing. We typically think about grieving over the loss of a loved one, but, of course, many other human experiences also cause grief: illness, job transitions, ruptured relationships, moves, and more. Even "happy" occasions like marriage, graduation, or the birth of a child can contain grief, as our identities shift realize we are also letting go of old ways of being.

Whatever we are grieving, there's one thing that's certain: there is no one "right" way to grieve. Each of us moves *[continued pg. 2]*

through the process in our own way and at our own time. And each of us needs a community of care to surround us as we grieve. It can be hard to know how to love someone well when they're grieving, can't it? I have always been thankful that the Church is a place where we can talk about these challenges and support one another in loving as best we know how.

Of course, we don't just run into grieving people at church....grieving people are everywhere, at all times. The Rev. John Pavlovitz recently wrote an essay, "Everyone Around You Is Grieving. Go Easy." I commend the whole essay to you - you can find it by googling the title and his name. In it, he says:

Everyone around you; the people you share the grocery store line with, pass in traffic, sit next to at work, encounter on social media, and see across the kitchen table—they're all experiencing the collateral damage of living. They are all grieving someone, missing someone, worried about someone. Their marriages are crumbling or their mortgage payment is late or they're waiting on their child's test results, or they're getting bananas five years after a death and still pushing back tears because the loss feels as real as it did that first day.

Let us be gentle with one another - and gentle with ourselves - as we exist within this oh-so-human experience of grief. Grief, as painful as it can be, is also a gift, because it is a tangible reminder of love shared. And even when the pain of grief threatens to overwhelm, we are not alone. God, who has been rejoicing and grieving since before the dawn of time, accompanies us....holding us together, wiping away our tears, whispering again and again, "I am with you. You are not alone." Thanks be to God.

Trustee News

The trustees have completed a busy summer. Projects completed include the following:

1. Cleaned the carpets in the entryway, sanctuary, and theater
2. Completed the installation of the security system
3. Repaired and replaced the guttering system on the East side of the building
4. Resolved the leaking problem on the office floor and cleaning gutters
5. Trimmed the large bush on the West side
6. Repaired the elevator
7. Approved purchase of new computers for the offices
8. Maintained the building and grounds as needed (with the much-appreciated help of volunteers throughout the summer)

It has been an expensive summer, but the projects completed were needed and necessary to help us move on to our future projects in the coming year. We hope to complete repairs to the East wall and the balcony walls next year and do some updating and repairs on the second floor. Cleaning the new carpet installed in Blachly and Pioneer halls is scheduled after the new year.

Closing the balcony

The trustees are announcing that the balcony will be closed during Sunday services beginning on November 3, 2019.

This decision has two purposes. First, it will improve security and safety for parishioners who attend Sunday as well as for the children in Sacred Space.

The second purpose is to promote fellowship between parishioners and visitors by having everyone on the main level of the sanctuary. This will also help prevent the awkwardness of having a first-time visitor seating themselves in Sacred Space with the children without knowing that's what the balcony is used for. The balcony will remain open for the children in Sacred Space as well as for parishioners who may have a special need to sit in the balcony. We ask that you check with an usher if you have a need to be in the balcony.

Closed signs will be posted on the balcony doors and at the elevator and at the steps to the second floor.

The balcony will be open for special occasions as needed. For example, the balcony is often used for overflow seating at Christmas Eve, Easter, and some weddings and funerals. Our goal is to improve security and safety while ensuring that everyone is comfortable coming to church and being a part of the service. We ask that everyone help us with this endeavor.

December 15th (during Sunday school hour).



Board of Mission

The Blessing Box

In order to help address hunger and food insecurity in our community, the ministry of our Blessing Box continues. Our church family provides soup, crackers, peanut butter, and other easy-to-prepare foods for our Manhattan neighbors, and at this time of year, we also stock the Blessing Box with gloves, hats, scarves, and socks to help stave off the winter cold. We fill the box on a daily basis with the goods that you bring in each Sunday. You can also drop off donations during the week if you're coming to the church; you can add to the Blessing Box directly, or you can put them in the tub under the coat rack in the narthex. We are making a difference in Manhattan: others outside our church family also contribute to this ministry by dropping off gifts of canned goods and other foods. Thank you for your continued support of this vital ministry!

Cobb Corner — Going Green

“The seriousness of environmental degradation lays bare the depth of man’s moral crisis.... Simplicity, moderation, and discipline as well as a spirit of sacrifice must become a part of everyday life” – *Pope John Paul II, as quoted in The Green Bible, 1-111.*

A few weeks ago, Bill and I were lucky enough to hear an excellent talk at KSU’s School of Leadership Studies by a charming and thoughtful woman telling of her life-changing experiences in The Gambia. Her name is Lily Colburn, the daughter of our wonderful church administrative assistant, Sandy Nelson.

As she talked, she noted sadly that in The Gambia she became more aware and embarrassed by the excesses of Western and especially U.S. lifestyles on the environment. She explained that if the whole world used natural resources like the U.S. we would need FIVE earths!! If the whole world used resources like The Gambia we’d manage with far less than one!

Her experience echoes our own during the years we spent in Asia. We had a little wastebasket for newspaper clippings. Everything else was recycled. Our greatest culture shock was coming home.

Manhattan is fortunate to have a great FREE recycling center in Howie’s, open 6 days a week.

Consider a New Year’s Resolution to have home trash collection half as often. We did that when the kids left home. Now it’s about twice a year for a saving of about \$280 a year! We go to Howie’s about twice a month, at our convenience.

Some Manhattan neighborhoods opt for a single trash carrier, with barrels at the curb just once a week, saving noise and significantly sparing road repairs according to the City’s director of roads.

Finally, as we ditch our noisy, polluting leaf blowers and prepare to quietly rake leaves, place some under evergreens, around bushes, or start or add to a compost pile. Experts suggest we should leave our yards a little messy to protect roots and provide food for birds and squirrels. That’s the kind of advice I love! —*Linda Richter*


