Lent: Into the Wilderness

The Sanctified Art Creative Team (which prepared our gorgeous, chock-full-of-Spirit-wisdom Lenten Devotionals) defines wilderness as "state of the wild." The season of Lent has its ancient roots in the story of Jesus's wilderness journey at the beginning of his ministry. A time of struggle, perseverance, trial, and transformation. During this season in the wild, Jesus was formed and forged for all the ministry that was to come.

Lent is a time of fresh starts and wilderness growth for any who dare to accept the Spirit's invitation to surrender into this holy season. We are offered the opportunity to seek clarity on a particular question that's been nagging us deep in our bones. Others will use this time as space for clearing aside the underbrush which can choke new growth - whittling away the extraneous to focus on what matters most. Lenten practices might include cutting out the extra chatter in our lives or listening more intently to the voices which give life. Some of us will *[continued pg. 2]*

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choose to abstain from something during this season while others might choose to add a new practice into our daily routine.

There is not a singular, "right" way to do Lent. There is only the invitation to step into the wilderness.

We don't necessarily know what will happen to us during our time out there in the wild. The stars overhead at night can be beautiful, but as the chill of evening sets in we might also start to feel worried or afraid. Gazing at the horizon, we put one foot in front of the other even though we're not sure exactly where we're headed.

In Lent, the journey itself is often the destination.

But we go forth into this season in confidence. Confident that if we surrender ourselves to the wide open spaces the Spirit will move within and among us, bringing new light and life as the days lengthen. Confident that we are not alone. We journey into the wild places with fellow travelers of The Way. We go, also, with the assurance that there is no place too wild or barren for God's accompaniment. We travel into the wilderness with Christ as our model, knowing that if the wilderness was good enough for him....well, surely it holds promises for us, as well.

Let go. Surrender. Make a bold (or tentative) movement into the wilderness. Jesus is waiting for us in the desert places, the wideopen spaces, the wild.

Save the Dates: Lent and Easter 2020

Lent is the 40 days preceding Easter and is a time when Christians traditionally cultivate their faith in more intensive ways. For some this may include giving something up or adding in a new spiritual practice. As a gathered community, we always include additional focused opportunities for worship and communal prayer. Because Easter is a movable feast (meaning, the date changes each year based on moon cycles), the dates for Lent change each year.

In 2020, the following dates will guide our journey through Lent and Eastertide: March 1: First Sunday of Lent April 5: Palm Sunday April 9: Maundy Thursday April 10: Good Friday April 11: Holy Saturday April 12: Easter Sunday May 31: Pentecost Sunday, which ends Eastertide



The Repudiation of the Doctrine of Discovery: A Biblical Reflection

Sundays in March at 9:30am



Many Americans grow up learning that this continent was "discovered" by Christopher Columbus. The concept of discovery, as if the land was empty prior to arrival and its indigenous inhabitants were somehow "less than" the explorers is, at its heart, racism and cultural superiority. Using resources prepared by the Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM) and Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) of the United Church of Christ, we will use stories from our sacred texts as an entry point for discussion about the legacies of colonialism and genocide. We will examine the role of the Church in causing violence and theological foundations for repentance and reconciliation.

Cobb Corner — Going Green

"Open your eyes and Behold! The whole world is full of God!" – Jacob Boechme (1575-1624) *The Way to Christ* in *The Green Bible*, Intro-104.

Climate change is an issue that has come into its own in this election year. As such it is tricky to discuss without appearing partisan. It is important to note neither party has a monopoly of environmental virtue. For example, Republican Teddy Roosevelt created the first national park. Democrat Franklin Roosevelt put thousands to work building and maintaining parks during the great depression. Even Sunset Zoo has cement picnic tables built during that era.

Republican Richard Nixon set up the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and supported passage of the Clean Air and Clean Water Acts. Democrat Barack Obama expanded protective legislation and further developed our national parks.

Republican Donald Trump has taken a different approach, weakening the Clean Air and Clean Water Acts and dozens of other environmental protections. Most of these decisions are being contested in the courts. Several of his cabinet appointments are openly hostile to environmental issues. The President has taken the U.S. out of the Paris Climate Accord that has been adopted by over 185 countries.

Still, it is an election year. In the last six weeks, the President has referred to himself as "The Environmental President," citing several actions he has taken which fact-checkers consider misleading or have been unable to confirm. Most recently he announced the One Trillion Trees Initiative in which the U.S. would plant billions of trees along with other unnamed nations. Some have noted the project is being supported by the timber and logging interests. The devil is in the details.

As campaigns go forward there may be lots of "greenwashing." This occurs when decisions are extolled as environmentally friendly which aren't. Meanwhile commentaries in the Green Bible urge readers to support environmental improvements and vote to make them a reality.

Now for some good news. Our city plants and maintains trees within about 15 feet of the curb.

Free. Just ask. In a typical year, the city plants about 200 trees in residential areas and parks. Last year Manhattan Rotary club planted an additional 200 trees! In fact, Manhattan became a Tree City USA in just the second year (1977) of the Arbor Foundation's national program according to J. David Mattox, the head of the city's forestry program. (Interview, Feb.20, 2020.) Today, more than 3400 cities have become or are seeking the coveted designation. (arborfoundation.com.)

Let's make our own good news in the year ahead. April 22 will be the 50th Anniversary of Earth Day! What will You, Your Family, Your Workplace, Your Church do to recommit to the only planet we have? Or, as my sweatshirt says, "Save the world, we may need it later!"


