To know that when we don't get it right we will continue to try again. To do it all with a spirit of love and grace, confident that God's concern embraces the whole world...and that includes us.

Update from Your Church Leadership

As we continue to navigate our way through these trying times, your leadership team is working to address the congregation's needs while making sure we do all we can to keep everyone safe and well.

Although our communities and counties have steadily loosened restrictions associated with COVID-19, the moderators in consultation with the cabinet will keep our position of taking things very slowly. We will continue as we have been and limit access to the building and continue on-line worship for the near future. The moderators and Pastor Caela are in regular communication via email, phone, and zoom meeting and we are all praying for the wisdom and the courage to make the right decisions about re-opening to protect all parishioners and visitors to our church.

It has been so encouraging to watch members of the congregation do so much to make sure worship remains powerful, that the needs of the church and the community beyond our doors are met, and that we continue to be such a blessing and strong force in confronting the very real societal issues we face today. The moderators are so thankful we get to work with all of you during this time.

To prepare for the eventual relaxing of our building restrictions, the Covid-19 Task Force made up of the moderators, the pastor and others who may be consulted are currently working on policies and procedures for staff use of the building, for small groups and organizations, and for any visitors entering our church. These policies and procedures will be critical for a safe and controlled re-opening. The Cabinet will approve these actions as they are developed.

We are also forming a Technology Task Force to begin planning for an expected need for innovative technology to be used in the sanctuary and elsewhere and to supply the guidance needed to incorporate that technology. This will be critical to keep our on-line presence when we begin to offer on-site worship at some point. The on-line services have gone so well and have provided a powerful source of strength and inspiration for the congregation

and for many outside our area who have been able to connect with us. When the time comes when we may again use the sanctuary it is our hope to incorporate technology so we can continue to have on-line worship to supplement in-person services. We want to continue to spread our message beyond our community and church walls.

Although there is no plan to resume any building use at present, by working on these items we can assure you we will be ready when that time comes.

We will continue to move slowly towards any re-opening and will keep everyone in the loop (so to speak) as your church leadership makes decisions about eventual re-opening.

For the present, we will continue to pray for the safety and health of all and for continued blessings for our parish. Peace and safety to everyone.

Summer Prayers @ 700 Poyntz

As we continue to worship online, we've learned in tangible ways that "real good church" can happen anywhere. Many have told us they kind of like worshipping in their PJs or cuddled up with family and pets on the couch! We also know that many of us miss the connection with have with our church building. It is a sacred space and something about being there opens our hearts to the movement of the Spirit in real ways.

If you are missing that connection with our church building or simply need a "set aside" place to pray, we invite you to spend some time in prayer outside our church building at 700 Poyntz. You could bring a picnic blanket and sit on the



lawn or bring a lawn chair from home. You might want to gaze up at the cloud floating overhead beyond our limestone walls or watch people pass by on Juliette or Poyntz. The front steps of the church, the big limestone sign, and the space outside the Juliette entrance are all nice places to find some quiet. As you come to the property to pray, we ask that you do not congregate with other people. If you notice someone else is praying, please come back at a later time.

We encourage you to snap a photo and/or write down your prayer to share via social media. You might even want to record a video of your prayer time. You can share these in the Facebook group or upload on our website at uccmanhattan.org/photo-video-portal. Please note if you do NOT want your post shared publicly via our Facebook page. Think about how neat it would be to see a prayer from one of our members every day this summer. Even though we can't be together in the sanctuary right now, we are still united through the Spirit.

Tuesdays 11:30 to 1:00: “The Meaning of Mary Magdalene”

Please consider joining us for the midweek ZOOM class. We are reading Cynthia Bourgeault’s book *The Meaning of Mary Magdalene*. Mary Magdalene is probably the most famous character in the Bible about whom the least is known. Bourgeault’s book seeks to address that, starting by look at what the Bible does say about her and how church tradition, art, and legend have added – and frequently distorted - the picture we have of Mary. In addition, Bourgeault introduces her readers to *The Gospel of Mary Magdalene* and other lost gospels and demonstrates how these lost writings have altered our perspective of her. What has emerged in recent years is a serious re-evaluation of Mary Magdalene’s place among Christ’s followers and Bourgeault thoroughly examines that new perspective.

Cobb Corner — Going Green

“There is no Second Nature.” – The Nature Conservancy

Are you exhausted, numb and angry after the last four months? You are not alone. But this month the focus will be mostly on good news.

Great news for our civil rights environment! Monday, June 15, the Supreme Court in a 6-3 decision held that the 1964 Civil Rights Act applied to LGBTQ individuals as well as others who had been discriminated against in employment matters on the basis of their sex! This ruling was handed down by Trump appointee, Justice Neil Gorsuch. The decision means among other things that the President’s earlier decision to ban such individuals from serving in the military is now null and void.

On other environmental fronts: The Riley County Humane Society has started a food pantry for pets! On the first and third Saturdays each month you can bring Purina products to donate starting at 8:30 a.m. From 9 to 10 you can also apply for free food for your pet. No one should have to surrender or abandon a beloved pet due to financial pressures. The pantry is located in the south part of First Methodist parking lot. This might be a good opportunity to model charity in which your children could participate.

More welcome news: The zoo is open to the general public! If you go, be sure to say “hi” to Susie, the oldest chimp in captivity in the world. She’s 65. You can recognize her by her gray muzzle and one bad eye. She made headlines about 10 years ago when she had a baby! Her daughter “Siri” is currently at the Oklahoma City Zoo.

Are you becoming buried in plastic grocery bags? Aldi continues to encourage you to bring your own totes. Aisles are one-way to facilitate distancing.

Consider registering for the free 15th annual Dialog on Sustainability taking place on July 18 via Zoom. This year’s shortened event will be 9:00-11:00 and focus on rural sustainability. Just send name, affiliation, phone number and email to Sheree Walsh chsr@ksu.edu.

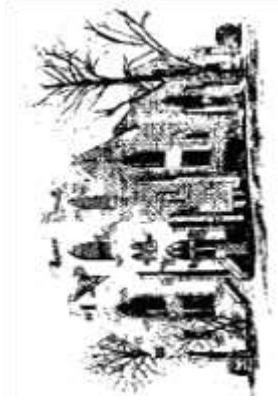
