## Confirmed in Love

In our congregation, we are blessed to have youth and families from many different religious traditions and backgrounds. The act of Confirmation means lots of different things in different settings, so as we prepare to begin Confirmation Class on March 1, I wanted to share a bit about my philosophy of Confirmation.

First, I think Confirmation is a powerful and important coming of age ritual. Being a teenager is hard work. Kids struggle as they move from childhood into adulthood. I'm guessing this has always been the case and most cultures have created rituals to aid that transition. I think Confirmation is one of those rituals. It is a time where we publicly bear witness to the fact that these children, whom we have known and loved since they were babies, are growing up. They are becoming adults. We give thanks for that reality and celebrate it together.

Second, churches like ours are congregational in polity. This is basically a fancy churchified way of saying we are democracies. We make big decisions by voting. We vote to elect our officers, approve our budget, call our pastor, and make

other major decisions in congregational meetings. At Confirmation, youth who have been confirmed are welcomed as full members of the church and are invited to vote in future congregational meetings.

Third, I see Confirmation as an opportunity for the church to, once again, confirm what we know to be true: that God knows and loves each of these youth, that God blesses their lives, and that nothing can break that bond. We confirm that we, the church, are committed to loving them during this time of transition from childhood to adulthood. We accept them for who they are. We recognize and celebrate their gifts. We know they will make mistakes, just like us, and we will love them through it. We are confirming them in our continuing love, which is rooted in the love of God.

Those of you who grew up in the Church and were confirmed may notice something is missing here. I didn't say anything about Confirmation as a time for kids to recite a catechism or make a profession of faith. In many traditions, Confirmation is seen as a time where the pastor teaches confirmands "what we believe as Christians" and then the youth decide whether they agree. If they do, they are Confirmed. If they don't, they aren't. In some traditions, youth write their own statement of faith. Regardless, Confirmation is primarily about "what we believe" and whether or not you want to opt in and be a part of us.

I'm not a fan of this (in case you couldn't tell!). First of all, I think it is laughable to try and define "what we believe" as Christians because there is such a diversity of belief. Second, I think what each individual believes is evolving over time. It's not that we won't talk about what we believe - we will, of course, but, to me Confirmation is more about being a place to open up and begin those conversations that will (hopefully) last a lifetime. Not a place to come to final conclusions. Perhaps more importantly, I don't think Confirmation is about deciding who's in and who's out. We're all in, of course. Regardless of our beliefs or actions, we are all loved by God and it is my sincere hope that Confirmation can be a time when the youth realize this even more fully.

A final note and then I'm done! Confirmation is also an amazing opportunity for me, as the Pastor. It is a privilege to be able to sit with these wise young-old souls and learn with and from them. It is

a joy to get to know these people more fully. In a position where I am often pulled in several direction at once, I cherish the opportunity to more fully focus on the youth as they are confirmed and spend uninterrupted time with them.

# Ministers of Care Team Forming

When we join in covenant as members of First Congregational UCC, we make a commitment "...to bear each other's burdens and share each other's joys, to pray for each other, to serve in the name of Christ..." One of the ways we can do this is by caring for those who are temporarily nor chronically home-bound, hospitalized, or otherwise unable to attend worship regularly. It is important that these people are visited regularly by the Pastor and by members of the congregation.

Pastor Caela and the Deacons are working to recruit and train a team of volunteer ministers to regularly visit our members who are unable to attend worship regularly. Minister of Care can expect to make 1-3 visits a month and will receive training and support from the pastor. Do you know someone who would make a great Minister of Care? Do you know of someone who is home-bound and should be visited regularly? Please contact Pastor Caela and let her know.

## News from the Cabinet

In December, The Transition Team made several recommendations to Cabinet regarding support of our pastor and evaluation of ministry. The first recommendation was to reshape the Pastoral Relations Committee so that it can be maximally helpful to the Pastor. In order to do this, a bylaws change was proposed to and has since been accepted by Cabinet—changing the number of appointees from 3 to 4 members as well as having the pastor appoint two members and cabinet appoint two members.

In addition, the Transition Team proposed changes to the annual evaluation of our ministry. The Cabinet is now seeking ways to make this process a more effective and meaningful part of our planning and visioning work for the church. Currently Cabinet is reflecting on a proposed bylaws change to move the responsibility for pastoral and ministry evaluation from the Deacons to the Cabinet.

We are planning to have a congregational meeting in April or May to vote on all of these bylaws changes at one time. In the meantime, we plan to move ahead with the new configuration of the Pastoral Relations Committee. ### Grow Green Match Day and the First Congregational UCC Endowment

Linda invited me to do this month’s Cobb column on a special aspect of going green.

This year First Congregational UCC will again participate in Grow Green Match Day on Earth Day, April 22. Grow Green is an event sponsored by the Greater Manhattan Community Foundation to help participating organizations grow their endowments as well as their operating resources. Every gift to an organization’s GMCF endowment will be matched 50% with a donation to the organization by a generous Manhattan donor. Endowment donations from \$25 to \$1000 per donor qualify for the match. As in the previous two years, Grow Green will take place 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., at Colony Square, 555 Poyntz Avenue. Cash, checks, and credit cards are all accepted, and donors may split their gifts among multiple participating organizations. In addition to our church, the Crisis Center, Shepherd’s Crossing, the Boys and Girls Club, and about thirty other organizations usually participate.

In the parable of the talents, Jesus noted the praise of the master for the servant who invested his resources wisely for future benefit. Endowments help to provide for the sustainability of organizations. The First Congregational UCC Endowed Fund at GMCF protects the principal of the donated funds and now pays the church several hundred dollars each year in unrestricted funds. We plan to participate in Grow Green again this year and know many others will take the opportunity to do so as well.
