“To Everything There is a Season”

“Do not go gentle into that good night,
Old age should burn and rave at close of day;
Rage, rage against the dying of the light.”

So begins Dylan Thomas’s famous poem, published in 1951, just two short years before Thomas’s death. Thomas died shortly after his 39th birthday, on Nov. 9, 1953. He was never given the opportunity to grow old, like his father who was the inspiration for the poem.

When I was a younger person, I adored the fierceness of this poem. Raging against death seemed, to me, to be the way to go. After all, there is so very much to do and see and enjoy and love during our time on this planet. Now that I’m a little older (and hopefully wiser?) I’ve had the chance to watch many people approach death. Some do, indeed, rage against it with all their might. Others quietly slip into What’s Next. And others, still, are taken from us with no warning. There are billions of ways to die....the only thing we have in common is that we will all do it at some point in time.

The Church is one of the few places in our culture where we talk openly and frankly about death. Our sacred texts are full of stories about death. We gather each month to commemorate the last meal of Jesus just before he died. We pray and sing at deathbeds. We gather to remember those who have passed. We shiver in the cold as we watch coffins lowered into frozen ground. We hear the story of the women who went to the tomb seeking Jesus's body only to find an incomprehensible surprise.

We've just passed the overly-commercialized celebration of Halloween. Long before it became a holiday about adult costume parties and kids eating sweets, Halloween had its roots in the Christian calendar. It was (and is) the first of a three-day holiday known as the Triduum of Allhallowtide. Halloween is a time to prepare for the celebration of All Saints' and All Souls' days. It is the time of the year when Christians around the world are meant to remember those who have died. The frivolity of Halloween itself is meant to be a break from the very serious and difficult work of remembering our mortality. As we dress up as ghouls and devils, monsters and zombies, we laugh in the face of Death, remembering the promise of Resurrection and the ultimate power of Goodness and Love that cannot be stopped.

This year on All Saints' Day we will pause and remember those who have been saints in our own lives. And then we will rush headlong into the holiday season...filled with family gatherings, which are often difficult for those who are missing faces around the table for the first time. In December, we will once again hold a Blue Christmas service for those who struggle with putting on a happy face during this season.

As the days grow shorter and the light dies, we notice the leaves dying around us. Some turn a brilliant orange overnight and fly to the ground. Others slowly, slowly turn brown and hang on for weeks before finally succumbing to the inevitability of gravity. And in every instance, we know that deep within the tree lies the promise and possibility of new life. Whether those leaves rage loudly or disappear with a whisper, they are only gone for a time. When spring comes, the leaves will return once again. To everything there is a season...and God goes with us throughout it all. Thanks be to God.

Cobb Corner — Going Green

“Pray for the Dead and Work Like Hell for the Living” — Mother Jones, early political activist and inspiration for *Mother Jones* magazine

November and December are major months for apparel and toy purchases. What I didn't realize was that those items expose recipients to a startling collection of dangerous chemicals!

“U.S. policy on toxic chemical control has been abysmally weak,” according to the executive director of Green America. Almost no progress has occurred in the last 40 years. (*Green American*, Fall, 2015, p.5.) For example, researchers have found that 81% of the products at Dollar General, Dollar Tree and Family Dollar have at least one hazardous chemical, while 49% contained two or more dangerous chemicals! Moreover, many of these items are for children who might handle or bite them. Examples include jewelry containing excess lead which can cause brain damage and Disney fingerpaints with high levels of chlorine, antimony and tin! (p. 4)

Clothing, in general, is also a concern. That “new clothing smell” is a sign of toxic chemical washes that need to be soaked and laundered out of clothes before wearing. Other suggestions for minimizing toxicity include: 1) Buy fewer clothes. 2) Buy used clothing or have apparel swaps. 3) Wash clothes less often and hang up for reuse, thus saving energy and helping clothes last longer. 4) Buy clothing from green companies with some eco-friendly fabrics. Even renewable bamboo is often used in clothing with conventional chemical finishes. 5) Avoid dryer sheets and fabric softeners. 6) Don't buy clothes needing dry cleaning, which typically uses an especially dangerous carcinogen. (p. 22) Also, avoid purchase of clothing with built-in sunscreen. Such fabrics are under investigation in Europe and by the American Cancer Society as potentially involved in cases of chronic inflammation! (p. 25)

It is very sad that unlike in Europe where items can't be marketed until proved safe, U.S. products must be proved very dangerous before they are removed.

Finally, if you want to know more about these issues, see the 2015 film, *True Cost*. Note that November 15th is National Recycle Day! Plan a gift for the planet!

Roots of Justice Anti-Racism Analysis Training

At our Vitality & Outreach meeting in October we gave thanks for the amazing support we have received from the wider community and the ways things are falling in place for our upcoming anti-racism training. To date, we have received pledges of support from eight partner organizations and several individuals, totaling over \$8,500 in donations. That amount includes \$1,000 from our own congregation via the Jerry & Atina Hanna Memorial Fund.

You are invited to register for the training, which will take place Jan. 15-17, 2016 (MLK weekend). Thanks to our generous sponsors, we are able to offer the three-day training at VERY reasonable rates (\$50 for students, \$125 for others before Nov. 25 and \$175 for others after that date). We will also have scholarships available. We hope to have a mix of ages and racial/ethnic groups represented, so please consider personally inviting students and people of color to the training.
