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Examining Ourselves and Our Work Together

Since June, a core group of church leaders have been working behind the scenes on some important things. Before I arrived, I asked to have a Transition Team appointed to work on a few critical tasks. We needed to create a position description for me as your Pastor and I knew I would need help getting acclimated and thought it would be nice to have a dedicated group of people I could pester with all my questions.

I am so thankful for the work of Craig Weston, Kerri Keller, Ann Smit, and Bill Pallett on the Transition Team. We've been meeting monthly and have done more than just write a position description. I'd like to tell you a bit about our work, as it is now coming to an end.

First, I do have a position description...and it is great. It was written in a way that honors our work together and will help me make determinations about how I spend my time and where I place my energy. I am especially pleased that *[continued pg. 2]*



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it includes a desire that I spend time in the community, connecting with folks outside our walls. And I love the portions we created about how I can best support all of you as church leaders in your work here. The Cabinet approved the description a few months ago and Sandy would be happy to pull a copy for you if you'd like to know more.

Along the way, we discovered several other big questions that we felt needed to be addressed. We asked the Cabinet for permission to work on creating some recommendations in these areas and Cabinet said, "What? You want to do more work? Go for it!" Our additional work focused on how we evaluate ourselves and our ministry – How is the pastor evaluated? How about other staff? What about all of us? We also spent some time talking about the role of the Pastoral Relations Committee and how that group might best be equipped to do their work.

In the next month or so, you'll see some potential bylaws changes coming your way for consideration. I won't get into the nitty gritty here, but do want to highlight just a few changes that Cabinet is going to recommend for us to consider. First, we would like to move the responsibility for assessing our ministries over to the Cabinet. Currently, that task resides with Deacons, but since the Cabinet is the group that is responsible for the full picture of what we do as a church, this seems to be a more logical place. We have some ideas about how to make this a truly useful exercise and look forward to what we can learn about how we are working to fulfill our mission. This will mean that Cabinet will move towards a greater focus on "the big picture" and will have less time for the small details. I think this is a good thing...and it will also be a challenge for us. But, hey, we can do hard things.

Second, the make-up of the Pastoral Relations Committee will change a bit, though their overall function will remain the same. This group meets at least quarterly and is a sub-committee of the Cabinet. Their role is to support the congregation and pastor in our work together. They do not supervise or evaluate the pastor. We are suggesting that the group be made up of four people – two appointed by Cabinet and two appointed by the pastor – and that none of those people hold major leadership roles in the church (so they are best able to be unbiased if any conflicts arise.)

This is probably quite enough from me about administration, huh? I hope this gives you a glimpse of some of the important work your church leaders are doing on behalf of all of us each and every day. I know that administration is not a riveting subject for many, but it is crucial to have structures in place to support our work together and to regularly review those structures and make improvements. I have been so thankful our leadership's dedication and skill as we wade through these tasks together. I hope you'll take time to attend information sessions and talk openly with our Cabinet members and me as we approach these potential changes to our Bylaws.


Join us for an in-depth look at Dr. King's life and legacy... beyond the dream.

Who are the Festive Feasters?

Who Can Be in Festive Feasters?

What are the rules?

There are no rules! Meals can be in our homes, at a restaurant, in a park, or wherever you choose to meet. The group can choose to meet for breakfast, lunch, or dinner, or sometime in between.

Can I join even if I live in too small a place to host when it's my turn?

Yes, you can. Many times folks have acted as "hosts" in the home of another group member.

Want some good environmental news? Over the years 2002-2013 sales of hybrid vehicles grew 1277% while all vehicle sales dropped 9.3%. Assets in socially responsible investments grew 38.5% and U.S. consumption of renewable energy rose 55% while that of non-renewables fell 6%. (Green American, Winter 2014). Moreover, monarch butterflies increased for the first time in years.

Do your New Year’s Resolutions include a greener lifestyle? Please share them with the rest of us. On my free and easy list: (1) Share magazines with friends and doctors’ offices. (2) Leo Schell’s great suggestion: skip all drive-throughs. They all waste gas and pollute. I’ve often noted I can eat or bank or get meds faster inside than lined up outside. (3) Start a compost pile on a sunny winter’s day and by spring your cast-off garbage, leaves and a little dirt will be free fertilizer for your spring garden—no toxins, no chemicals, and less trash for the landfill.
