Recently I was doing my morning scripture reading and these words from Psalm 116 shimmered for me: "Return to your rest, my soul, for the Lord has been good to you. For you, Lord, have delivered me from death, my eyes from tears, my feet from stumbling, that I may walk before the Lord in the land of the living." They reminded me of a Taizé song that I love, but haven't sung in a while: "I am sure I shall see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living. Yes, I shall see the goodness of our God, hold firm, trust in the Lord."

Hold firm. Trust in God.

These short words are easier said than done. It can be easy to say, "Each day we wake up is a gift. There is goodness to be found even in the midst of pain." Those statements are true AND we can all still find we have days when the bottom drops out and we can't find even a speck of joy. Both things are true. These were like mantras for me in 2020, and I know the same is true for many of you. And so, another year begins. And we walk in the land of the living together. We continue to Love Unconditionally, Challenge Spiritually, Minister Fervently. We may not be exactly sure what this will look like in 2021, but we trust that God will guide us - comforting us when we hurt, giving us grace when we stumble, bubbling up with joy when we need it most.

Hold firm. Trust in God.

This is still the promise and invitation in 2021. We live into it together.

We can swing between disappointment, helplessness, and gratitude on a daily basis. There are also seasons of our lives when we feel inundated with more of one than the others. As we enter the new year, we had hoped we would be past the "O No!" of the last several months. Instead we find ourselves with ongoing prayers for "Help!" The Book of Psalms knows all about this. Written over a span of time from exile and isolation to the rebuilding of the community, the poetry of the Psalms will accompany us in this series, reminding us that through it all, we can trust and even give our thankful "Oh Yeah!" because God is, indeed, holding our lives.

Introducing: Marlin Watson of Companion Projects Media

After the pandemic thrust us into the world of online worship, our staff and volunteers made countless adjustments to the way they prepare for worship each week. In July, we began partnering with Marlin Watson of Companion Projects Media to provide weekly video editing services for us. Each week, Marlin takes the various videos created by us and edits



them together into the worship service we participate in each Sunday morning. Pastor Caela works with him every weekend to make final revisions and then the service is uploaded to Facebook Live and YouTube so we can all worship together. We also provide DVDs of the services to a couple of members in our congregation who don't have internet access.

Since Marlin has been a part of our team for almost six months now we realized it's past time to introduce him to you! Marlin is a freelance photographer and videographer here in Manhattan. He grew up mostly in Germany where he met his future wife, Sharice, in patch barracks, an American Base in Stuttgart. The two stayed in touch over the years and eventually made Manhattan their home.

Marlin says the vision for CPM is simple: "From the very beginning when we were taking small jobs from friends and family, we strived for a seamless relationship with them. They had the visions and we worked hand-in-hand to bring them to life. Now that we've grown, we don't want to stray from that mindset. The name Companion Projects stems from the idea that the creative process is a partnership." Marlin has been an absolute delight to work with and we are so grateful for our partnership with him.

Cobb Corner — Going Green

"This time, like all times, is a very good one, if we but know what to do with it." – Ralph Waldo Emerson

This sage advice came in a Christmas card from John and Judy Siddoway in Utah who invited Bill and me several years ago to an unforgettable experience – visiting the Mormon Tabernacle while the world-famous choir was rehearsing a splendid performance. It was serendipitous: They were neighbors of son Rob and his family. We try to remind ourselves to be open to such unplanned moments which so enrich our over-scheduled lives. No problem with that THIS YEAR!

In 2020 many of us have saved money on gas, enjoyed cleaner air, but worried about covid and finances. January 10 is Cut Your Energy Costs Day! For tips, go to Energy.gov. Other suggestions that can save hundreds in the future and give the planet a little more time: First, compost your garbage. Contact Carol Sevin for advice if using worms or just create a compost pile in your backyard. Your garbage disposal will last forever and you'll never buy fertilizer again!

Secondly, cut trash service to once or twice a month. By going to Howie's with your recyclables you may also find oodles of books in the telephone book bin. We've found thousands these last two years for ourselves, friends, and libraries in the area. In the process you may find you only need trash service occasionally. Three, replace incandescent bulbs and CFLs with LEDs that can last 10,000 hours! Use up old bulbs in closets or places where they are handy but only used briefly.

Good news: Next fall USD 383 will get 100% of its energy from renewables! KSU and Washburn are also involved. Green, clean energy and significant savings are win-win! Solar and wind are already providing many times as many jobs globally as fossil fuels while avoiding the disastrous impacts of coal, oil and gas. (McKibben, 2020).

Finally, I want to suggest two books available at our library. The first I mentioned last month before I read it: *Falter*, by Bill McKibben. *The Washington Post* has named it among the top 10 books of the year! I totally agree. It is simply amazing. McKibben, noted for his works on climate change, includes both harrowing and heartening information on this topic. But he goes well beyond this to consider the pros and cons of artificial intelligence and gene editing – both of which force us to consider what it means to be human.

Jane Fonda's latest book, *What Can I Do?*, was recommended to me by Gayle Doll. Fonda has been an activist on climate issues for some time, but now shows the general public how they can make a difference.

Now you have two more reasons to stay at home and socially distance!
