"They are like trees planted by streams of water, which vield their fruit in its season." Psalm 1:3a

Later this month, I'll be "traveling" (in quotes because it's all virtual this year) to the 33rd Synod of the United Church of Christ. I'm serving as a part of the Kansas-Oklahoma delegation and the theme of this year's gathering is "Rooted in Love." It will be a very different type of Synod experience, of course, and I appreciate the theme because it helps me remember how important it is to stay rooted in love during this ongoing time of transition.

As I talk with people these days, many are feeling some sense of "normalcy" creeping back into their lives. Some have. excitedly told me "everything feels normal again," while others are remembering that there were things about the Before Times [continued pg. 2]

they don't want to return to. Those who live with unvaccinated or immunocompromised family members often tell me "normal" still seems like it's off on the horizon and not here yet. Many of us are still very aware that the pandemic isn't over and that we cannot simply gloss over the immense grief and losses the world continues to suffer. And even those who are enjoying a return to some normalcy tell me it's all quite an adjustment.

My guess is we, as a congregation, will continue to live in the midst of all this tension, too. It's so good to be able to continue to expand the ways we can be together in person safely...and it's not exactly like it used to be. It's wonderful to have in-person AND online worship...and we are going to continue to see growth and changes and challenges in the ways our ministry continues to evolve and respond to the needs of an ever-changing world.

As much as I might want to done with liminal time (please and thank you very much, Jesus), it seems it is still very much with us. In this time, I find myself clinging to the image of a big, tall, strong tree. Rooted in Love, reaching deep down into the soil for nutrients and high into the air for the sunlight. Flexible as it waves in the breeze. Changing with every season. Responding to all the changes happening around it and growing bigger in love. When I feel discombobulated (which is often these days), I sit with this image of a tree, rooted in God's love, and find some measure of peace.

What images are speaking to you during this time of ongoing change? What small glimmers of hope on the horizon are giving you strength? Have you made time to sit with the Spirit and share the pain you've experienced? And the joys, too?

One of the joys that's coming up in our congregation is the confirmation of 8 youth on July 11th. Wow! As we confirm them in love, let's recommit ourselves to being rooted in God's love....big, strong, flexible trees reaching down, reaching up, reaching out to share that love with all we encounter in the world around us. I encourage you to take a moment and read about how you can be a part of sharing God's love with our confirmands by writing down your favorite Bible stories on post it notes (page 7) and by welcoming Christ in our midst by looking out for new faces at Sunday morning worship (page 6).

Connecting with Pastor Caela

Caela keeps her own calendar, so if you'd like to connect, the simplest thing is to e-mail, call, or text to set up a time. Mondays through Wednesdays are typically best for routine meetings, as Thursdays are used for sermon and worship preparation and Friday-Saturday are her days off. Caela tries to honor work-life balance by responding to non-urgent text and voicemail messages only during regular work hours. Please note that if you ever have an emergency between the hours of 10pm-7am you will need to CALL Pastor Caela, not rely on text messages, as she does not receive them overnight.

UCC General Synod: Online July 11-18

Every two years, the entire United Church of Christ gathers for our General Synod. This year, Synod is July 11-18 and is happening entirely online, which means it's much easier to attend all or part of the event! Keynote speakers include social justice activist Valerie Kaur and Rev. Adam Russell Taylor, president of Sojourners.

You can sign up to receive updates and register to be a General Synod visitor on the Synod website <u>www.generalsynod.org/</u>. Pastor Caela will be participating in Synod as a part of the Kansas-Oklahoma delegation in her role as Vice President of the KO Conference.

Health Policy Updates

The Church Cabinet recently made some updates to our COVID policies and we wanted to share those with you.

Updates:

□Small groups of 15 or fewer are now permitted to meet INDOORS in the church building or offsite, following all of our general policies like masking, distancing, etc. (We still ask that boards/committees meet via Zoom as we continue to work on setting up options for hybrid meetings and discuss the best ways to meet in the future.)

When you are in the church building, you may remove your mask if you are in a room alone or with only members of your household (please put your mask back on if someone enters the room)

All groups take place outdoors and participants agree to follow our congregation's COVID safety measures. You can read full details at <u>uccmanhattan.org/covid</u>. The highlights are: don't come if you're sick/quarantined, wear a mask, maintain at least six feet distance from those outside your household, keep track of who attends in case we need to complete contact tracing.

Cobb Corner — Going Green

"You cannot get through a single day without having an impact on the world around you. What you do makes a difference and you have to decide what kind of a difference you want to make." – Jane Goodall

It's time to talk about dirt! Not a religious topic? It should be because it is absolutely critical to our planet's future. An area of soil about the size of Costa Rica is permanently destroyed every year. The UN Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) estimates 1/3 of the world's soil is degraded or simply dead dirt while other experts say only 60 years of topsoil are left in the world! ("Soil Not Oil–The key to Curbing Climate Change" *Green America*, 2015).

What's ruining our living soils? Monocropping – from corn to lawns with pesticides, plowing and deforestation, drought, urbanization – the list goes on. Water shortages, famine, and the movement of climate refugees have already begun.

Even as individuals living in towns and cities we can make a difference by our actions. Here are just a few of the ways my neighbors are helping: (1) Many compost, avoiding commercial products that can be dangerous. (2) Some of us are planting trees, native grasses, vegetation for pollinators, and eliminating or reducing our lawns. (3) Some have rain gardens or rain barrels. I personally count on about 1200 gallons of rain water each year. (4) Still others tend our traffic circles or roundabouts, thereby beautifying and making our streets safer.

As the population grows and our options to deal with climate change narrow, it is imperative we each protect God's creation by keeping our soil and souls enriched.
