God: As Close as Our Breath

Have you ever had the experience of picking up a book or listening to a lecture and suddenly feeling like you're looking in a mirror? You think to yourself, "YES! This is what I've been thinking/feeling/experiencing all along but I didn't know there was a name for it!" or perhaps "This person is explaining what I already know so much better than I ever could!"

This was my experience recently when attending one of my monthly class sessions with the Souljourners program. I am wrapping up my first year in this three-year training program for aspiring spiritual directors. Each month we've gathered over Zoom for a weekend-long class on topics like world religions, the Reformations and Counter-Reformations, mysticism and more. We also focus each month on a particular skill that will help us in our work as spiritual directors. Recently, our topic was Celtic Spiritualities and despite being married to a person who speaks Irish Gaelic and knows a lot about Celtic cultures, I went into the session with very [cont. pg. 2]

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little knowledge about the topic. Imagine my surprise when I found myself thinking again and again, "Wait! This is so very similar to the Christianity I already know! And it sounds so much like what I've heard preached and taught in various UCC gatherings over the years!"

We learned about how Christianity grew among Celtic peoples and was interwoven with earlier ways of experiencing the world, creating unique strains of Christianity that have a different flavor than those developing in Rome, Northern Africa, or the Eastern Church. I love learning about how diverse Christianity is and has always been. You've often heard me say "Christianity is a big place," and this has been true since the beginning. We have never been a religion of one mind (as much as some parts of the Church wish it were so). Instead, regional flavors and cultural differences have always existed within our faith. What holds us together as the Church is simply a desire to stay in covenant with one another - not some agreement on points of doctrine.

Celtic experiences of the Holy easily made room for diverse ways of understanding God because the hierarchy of the larger Church was not privileged as much as in some other parts of Christianity. God was seen as intimate, present in all aspects of daily life, "as close as our breath," and fully accessible to all people. God isn't found only in the walls or rituals of the Church, but in everyday life, especially in nature. The two great teachers of the faith in these traditions are Scripture and nature - because God is believed to be Still-speaking in ancient stories and in the natural world around us. The emphasis of faith is not on "knowing about God" but "knowing God," and prayers are meant to be experienced as unceasing. There are prayers for milking the cow, chopping the vegetables for dinner, tending the hearth in the morning and night. Prayer is not seen as something we create on our own, but as a posture of awareness and joining our own spirits to an ancient, unfolding song of thanksgiving that already exists in the world.

So many of these aspects of Celtic Christianities remind me of what many of you tell me you've experienced in your own faith journey this past year - an awareness of the Holy in nature, a deep knowing that God can be found anywhere in the world, and a sense that God journeys with us in the day-to-day moments of our lives. If you'd like to learn more about Celtic Spiritualities, you might want to Google "Carmina Gadelica" to read a selection of old prayers passed

down orally through generations and preserved by Alexander Carmichael in the 19th century. I also recommend the book Listening for the Heartbeat of God by J. Philip Newell as a short, but comprehensive overview of Celtic Christianities.

Led by Sue Zschoche.


September 5: The Rich Man and Lazarus.


UCC General Synod

New Artwork for our Church Building

On Sunday, July 25th we blessed new artwork for our building. "Jesus Loves," was created by local artist and church member Paulicia Bender Williams at the request of our Board of Justice & Witness. The painting will be hung in our main lobby and we are grateful for

several donors who provided the funding for the artwork. It's such a gift to hear God's stillspeaking voice through art and we are so blessed by this painting. In case you missed the unveiling during worship, we wanted to be sure and share a bit from the artist about the painting.

"Jesus Loves," 2021 Statement from the artist, Paulicia Bender Williams local artist and member of First Congregational UCC:



Considering what we already know about Jesus and what his values were, I imagined what he'd be doing if he was still on Earth. I felt he'd be consistent. He'd still teach Love by being it and showing it through the way he treats the weakest among us. The ones who require the most love, patience, and compassion- our children. Love seemed the perfect name for the book he reads from and, if you look closer, you'll notice the scars on his hands and feet.

I painted the children to represent the beauty and diversity in our own. The 'goldfish' crackers are a play on when Jesus fed the multitudes with 5 loaves of bread and 2 fish. The blue blanket is inspired by when he walked on water, and the rainbow stitching in the blanket represents our LGBTQ+ community.

Jesus' clothing, a shalwar kameez, is a common style worn in parts of the Middle East and Africa. He is also seated by a barn, a place that may bring him peace due to the circumstances of his birth. The barn is a freshly painted blood red, made new again.

This is actually my 2nd attempt at this painting. I kept getting the sense that I was supposed to start over and include our seal point Siamese Daryl in the finished piece. The feeling was so overwhelming I obeyed. Daryl was in the vet hospital due to complications from feline diabetes and a week later he died. This, and the love we have for FCUCC, makes Jesus Loves extra special for our family.

This call for peace with nature struck me with unusual force after hearing of a resident's expensive struggle to kill tiny plants growing in a few places in his lawn. Hundreds of dollars later the plants were poisoned along with the bees who loved it and brown streaks dotted the yard. Watering will restore the grass, but the poison will wash down the gutters to the sewer. Birds, worms and all life in touch with that poison will sicken or die.

This is an extreme case but I suspect most of us have used a toxic substance for less than a vital reason. The irony is that we or our descendants may become victims of our carelessness.

Now to make amends. Recycling is extremely important to slowing climate change but we need to do it correctly or we'll gum up the machinery and endanger those operating it. *Mother Earth News* (Dec/Jan, 2021, pp. 56-59) highlights the problem in an article titled "The Worst Things to Throw in the Recycling Bin:"

- Lithium-ion batteries —These can catch fire. Instead go to www.Call2Recycle.org, punch in your zipcode for closest location.
- Shredded paper –It can clog machines. Compost or take to shredder events.
- Plastic bags, film, tarps –Turn into grocery or other chain stores.
- Hoses, wire and extension cords –These can play havoc with machines.
- Sharp objects, syringes and medical waste.
- Glass food and beverage containers can be recycled but NOT mirrors, windows, or bakeware.

Additionally the article noted disposable diapers as a particular menace of which nothing can be recycled. I would have noted the cost! Cloth diapers are cheap, can last through several children and can be eventually used as rags. Disposables are convenient for traveling but one can spend over \$2000 a child on them if they are used exclusively!

Finally, the article noted the U.S. currently recycles about 35% of its trash which is up from 10% in 1960. San Francisco recycles over 75%; Alabama only 9%. How does your household compare?

Second Helping Update

Second Helping volunteers have had a busy year so far in 2021, assuring that our guests have hearty and healthy to-go hot Sunday suppers and sack lunches. We are serving around 60 hot meals and 50 lunches every Sunday. In the first 6 months of this year, we have served **1,799 hot meals** to guests, including 11 or more weekly meals to the Pawnee Crisis Unit. We also provided **1,368 sack lunches**. That's a total of 3,167 meals! A HUGE THANK

YOU to the cooks, Sunday helpers, lunch makers, dessert makers, grocery picker-ups, meal deliverer and all who have donated cash and food items to this mission.



If you are interested in being part of this important mission of our church, these are our needs:

- **shelf-stable food:** oatmeal packets, peanut butter snack crackers, cereal bars, canned vegetables (and we LOVE big cans) and slaw, ranch and Italian salad dressings.
- cash donations: for food items needed for meals and lunches and for To-Go supplies
