Atul Gawande. Some of you may know Ms. Robinson by her other novels, *Gilead* and *Housekeeping*. *Lila* takes place in that same small town of Gilead and tells the backstory on the Rev. John Ames' wife's life. It was hard reading at first. I texted one of my best friends to say, "This book is painful. Will it be worth it?" Jennifer promised me it would be and she was right. It's a beautiful story of grace, redemption, and love.

Being Mortal by Atul Gawande is one of those books that I've already recommended to 15 people since I finished it a few weeks ago. Dr. Gawande is a surgeon...and he's also a gifted storyteller. In *Being Mortal* he deals with end-of-life and aging issues from the perspective of a doctor, an adult son, and a U.S.-American of Indian descent. Because he writes so well, I could hardly put the book down. You can expect a book study on this one in the future!

Right now I'm in the middle of *Life of Pi* (haven't read it yet, can you believe it?) and in the pile next are *Sabbath as Resistance* by Walter Brueggemann and *The Other Wes Moore*, which is the K-State common read for the upcoming school year. As we settle into summer together, I hope you'll find some time during these months to relax and enjoy whatever it is that soothes your soul, be it reading or something else. And if you read something good, please let me know so I can add it to my list!

Worship in the Park



“To desire to be rich is to desire to have more than what we need to be content.” — Amish saying, *The Green Bible*, I-33.

This time of year many are moving. The trash bins are overflowing. For some of us with strong hunter-gatherer genes it is a time that both horrifies and delights. The vast amount of things discarded would furnish, clothe and feed a village. Still, when I've seen something useful and inquired about it or rescued it ahead of the trash truck, no one seems to mind.

This month has been especially amazing. Over 800 books, garden pots, a huge Boston fern, sacks of oranges, grapes and apples are just a few of our freebies! True, we needed none of these things, but we ate the fruit, re-homed 600 books to the public library, took 99 children's books to Northview School, gave boxes of vinyl records to friends and kept other books and records for ourselves. Other alternatives should you find some treasures are to post your items on freecycle.com, or give things to the Salvation Army or the Encore Shop. For furniture, tools, paint, and lumber, Re-Store will pick up your things to be used in building homes for Habitat for Humanity.

Let's vow to acquire more deliberately. A University of Minnesota study found that people buy more of everything – not just food – when they are hungry! Don't you love a study that urges us not to get hungry!

Finally, let's try to find someone or someplace that can use what we no longer need. I especially appreciated the recent donations to the animal shelter which were received with delight by the dedicated staff.
