“Name her (so that she lives).”

When I was in seminary I took several courses with Dr. Rufus Burrow on the life and ministry of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.. Dr. Burrow was famous (infamous?) for giving papers back to his students that were....well, decorated. He used several colors of pens – red, blue, purple, green, black. They were a code of some sort that I never figured out. Dr. Burrow would sometimes write more in response to my paper than I had written in the paper itself.

On my first paper, one comment in particular stood out. I was describing King’s upbringing and mentioned several people in his family of origin. Dr. Burrow underlined where I had written “King’s older sister” and wrote underneath, “Name her (so that she lives), Caela.” After that, I never forgot to call Christine King Farris by name.

Names are powerful. Frederick Buechner says this about names:

It is my name. It is pronounced Beekner. If somebody mispronounces it in some foolish way, I have the feeling

that what's foolish is me. If somebody forgets it, I feel that it is I who am forgotten. There's something about it that embarrasses me in just the same way that there's something about me that embarrasses me. I can't imagine myself with any other name: Held, say, or Merrill, or Hlavacek. If my name were different, I would be different. When I tell somebody my name, I have given him a hold over me that he didn't have before. If he calls it out, I stop, look, and listen whether I want to or not.

In the book of Exodus, God tells Moses that God's name is Yahweh, and God hasn't had a peaceful moment since.
(Wishful Thinking: A Seeker's ABC)

In the coming weeks and months we will have quite a few guests pass through our doors. I can't tell you the number of times someone has told me, "I kept coming back to this church because someone greeted me by name each week." Names matter.

Let's remember to wear our nametags and ask newer folks their names (and then use them). If you, like me, sometimes feel awkward about introducing yourself, I am sorry. I know it's hard. But we are called to be the presence of God to those who enter this place (and those who never do). And part of that ministry is asking, learning, and using names. When I'm not sure if I've met someone before, I will sometimes say, "I'm sorry, I can't recall if we've met before. My name is Caela. What's yours?" Or sometimes I really mess it up, as I did last Sunday when I said to someone who looked new, "What's your name?" and then he told me and I realized we've met before. Ugh. I kick myself when that happens.

But as hockey player Wayne Gretzky said, "You miss 100% of the shots you don't take." Asking, learning, and using names is brave and important work. It is how we recognize that unmistakable uniqueness of another individual. Names help us live.

Church Host: Greet guests, help them find available seating, monitor dining room.


Dessert: Make a dessert to serve 35-40 people, sign up on the church sign-up board outside the kitchen or contact Mary Ellen Barkley.

Adult Education This Fall

Lots of space for learning and growing together this fall. We hope you'll make time to join us. Adult Education at First Congregational is a great way to dive a little deeper into your own faith and to get to know other people in our community better.

Sunday School for Adults

Six Stories for Us (Aug. 23 through Sep. 27) – Pastor Caela will facilitate this six-week class. We will explore six core stories in the Bible that are foundational to our faith. From the Creation stories to Ruth to the Walk to Emmaus. Come and dig deeper into the Bible as we listen for the voice of our Still-speaking God.

Vietnam Conflict from a Christian Perspective (Oct. 4 - Nov. 15) – Kristin Mulready-Stone, a member of our congregation and Associate Professor of History at K-State, will lead a seven-week exploration of the Vietnam Conflict. We will have a chance to learn about the war in Vietnam from both sides, rather than solely the U.S. point-of-view most of us are probably more familiar with. Kristin will incorporate the history of imperialism in the region, as well as theological and social justice questions and observations.

Music of the Season (Nov. 29 – Dec. 20) – David Wood, a member of our congregation and director of the K-State Collegium Musicum, will help us explore Advent and Christmas music during this four-week course. Join us to learn more about the origins of some Christmas favorites and discover new music that may speak to your soul.

Coming in September: Church Night

Join us on Thursdays from September 10 through October 29 for Church Night. There will be dinner, adult Bible study, a children's creative activity (plus nursery care for toddlers and babies), plus Taize worship. Tai Amri has a Masters of Theology from the Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley, CA and a B.A. in Writing and Poetics from Naropa University in Boulder, CO. His position with us is ten hours a week, meaning we will see him on Sunday and occasionally during the week. Cobb Corner — Going Green

“If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together.” — African saying

Last month I bemoaned Branson, Missouri’s lack of recycling despite its 8 million annual visitors. Little Rock, Arkansas, offers a more hopeful environmental contrast. We were amazed at the spectacular architecture of the President Clinton Library and Museum. It had earned the highest LEED Platinum award for environmental sustainability. As a former teacher of the presidency I’ve always liked such museums and this one was remarkably candid about the successes and unforced errors of the President. Even his detractors can be nostalgic for the low unemployment rate, the absence of wars and the first and last balanced budget and surplus since 1952!

Next door is the Heifer Foundation, another LEED platinum building. The headquarters were filled with school children examining the many interactive exhibits explaining the nonprofit’s work in developing countries. It operates on the assumption that by helping a family with economic resources like a cow or a pig, one can improve income and diet. Moreover, when the gift animal has offspring, one of those animals can go to another impoverished family, etc. This model has been successful in the developing world. Our church kids a few years ago bought a llama for one such family.

Our final stop was the massive Little Rock High School, the only functioning school in a national park!

I had wanted to see this place since I was starting high school in 1957 just as 9 black students were trying to enroll there. They were violently turned back until President Eisenhower sent federal troops to the scene. It seemed unreal then that people could be so vicious toward the students that the president had to act. The park visitor center has numerous exhibits and TV footage of the struggle. It’s a sad reminder of a racist era we keep hoping is over, but unfortunately isn’t.

Introducing Sacred Space: A new Kids' Worship experience

Kids' Worship kicked off just about a year ago and has since grown into an exciting ministry that we offer here at First Congregational. It is a space for kids to play, learn, and worship together. At this one year point it is time for some new developments. Kids' Worship has been a space for our children of all ages to come together. The tricky thing about that is the age range that exists. We want to make sure that our pre-school students are getting a positive experience as well as our 5th grade students. With that in mind we have decided to create additional programming for kids to utilize during the worship hour.

Kids' Worship will continue at the same time and same place. I am thrilled to announce that Tim Tarkelly will be joining our childcare staff specifically to lead Kids' Worship. Tim is a 2nd year Graduate student in Drama Therapy at K-State and has a large amount of experience working with children and working in worship settings. He brings a wealth of experience and talents to

the Kids' Worship service. The goal will be to have Kids' Worship focus on an experience for Pre-school through 2nd graders.

Barrett will also be leading another Kids' experience during worship called "Sacred Space." Some of the kids have expressed an interest in staying and being a part of the larger worship service. Beginning August 23rd Barrett will form a "Kids' section" of the Sanctuary in the balcony to allow the kids to sit together and have the experience of being in worship. As the service begins Barrett will talk through the weekly bulletin with the kids; introducing any special items that week (baptisms, communion, etc.) in order to give them a chance to talk through what will happen in worship. Following the sermon each week Barrett will meet with the kids outside of the sanctuary to discuss what they heard in the sermon. The goal will be to have this discussion geared towards our upper elementary school-aged students (2nd-6th).

The goal of all of these opportunities is to help the kids of our church learn about being in worship. We hope that through both of these opportunities the kids will develop a love for the worship experience. As has always been the case for Kids' worship, these are both optional experiences. Children are always welcome to sit with their families during worship. These new worship experiences will kick off on Sunday, August 23rd.
