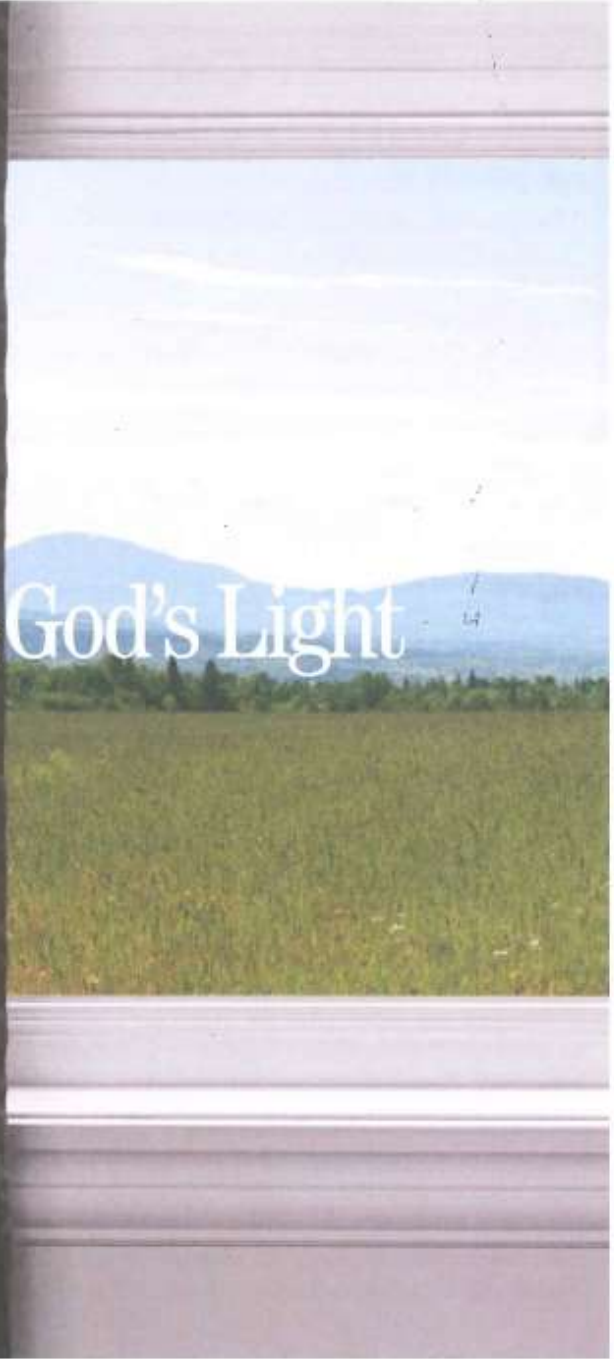

We are pleased to welcome Stephanie Mott to our pulpit today.

Stephanie Mott lives in Topeka, Kansas. She is employed as a Contract Mental Health Clinician at Valeo Behavioral Healthcare. Stephanie is the Founder/Director of the Transgender Faith Tour and President/Executive Director of Kansas Statewide Transgender Education Project. She is a columnist for Liberty Press and a volunteer blogger for Huffington Post. She has published more than 100 articles about being transgender. She has provided more than 400 workshops and presentations related to gender identity in venues from college classes to mental health centers to jails, prisons and hospitals. She is currently serving as the community liaison for transgender inmates with the Shawnee County (Kansas) Jail. She is currently serving as the state vice-chair of Equality Kansas. In addition, she is a board member of the Topeka Chief of Police Advisory Board and Capital City Equality Center, as well as serving on the advisory board for the Beacon Youth Group. Her awards include the Pioneer Woman from the University of Kansas Emily Taylor Center for Women and Gender Equity, the Kansas Stonewall Marsha P. Johnson Award for Exceptional Activism, and the Donna Love Award for Outstanding Social Work Student from Washburn University.

Christmas Sacks – The Common Table would like to distribute Christmas sacks again this year to the neighbors who attend Common Table meals. One church will provide socks, another will provide caps, etc. First Congregational has been asked to provide unscented toiletries for the sacks. Body wash, shampoo, and deodorant would be particularly helpful, and we anticipate making up 50 sacks. The deadline is December 17, and there will be a collection bin in the church entry. Hello Friends,

These days we need not look very far to find violence and danger in our world. We used to have the luxury of distance, witnessing most of it on the nightly news or reading about it in the newspaper. Sadly, that distance has evaporated. With our smart phones and social media, every chirp of a Twitter update or notification from our favorite newsfeed, the world's troubles are directly at our fingertips. All of this instant information carries with it the potential to create mountains of anxiety within us while we await the next "breaking news" alert. Even some of our wrist-watches have been corrupted into aiding and abetting our fears, making world's problems forefront in our minds.

We as a church are faced with a difficult question: how do we keep ourselves safe AND profess our love for one another AND fulfil the need to congregate together in a way that walks the path of life in the way Jesus did? While I don't have the answer, I do know our congregation has some of the highest caliber individuals I have ever met and I believe the answer to that question can be found living within us and sitting next to us each Sunday. Therefore, our congregation is considering the development of a Safety and Security committee. We will need a few interested individuals to help sort through some of the issues we as a congregation face. This group will thoughtfully and deliberately explore how to best protect our church building and church family in a manner that reflects our values and our mission statement. This committee will be tasked with things like emergency planning, evaluating the safety of our nursery and classrooms (recommending upgrades as needed), and ensuring our building is as safe as it can be while still preserving it as a beacon of light for our faith and our community, through peace, unity, and inclusivity.

If you feel you are the kind of person who would like to help find solutions for navigating safely through the darkness of our current world, please find me to discuss this or add your information to the "Ministry Opportunities" sheet in our weekly programs. As we strive for peace in this world may we also gain some peace-of-mind as well.

Poverty Truth Commission. As an outgrowth of the Poor Peoples' Campaign, motivated in Kansas by Rev. William Barber and his team at their visit to Topeka in August, there is an interest in building a Poverty Truth Commission in Manhattan. The Commission is based on a model that is been used in other states. People who are experiencing poverty would publicly share their own stories in a setting where those who have the power to make a difference would be present. Relationships will be built and concrete follow up plans will be made. We are seeking someone to serve on a Steering Committee with perhaps 5-10 other people from the local community. You would represent our congregation, plan the event, and collaborate efforts with the Vitality Committee.

Second Helping is in need of additional church hosts. The church host greets the guests, makes sure people have what they need, and generally monitors the progress of the meal. Volunteers will be paired with an experienced host until they feel comfortable with the position. The church hosts often get to know the guests over time, which is a privilege of the host position. If you would like to serve in this important role, please indicate your name and contact information on the line.

Ministers of Care. Do you have a heart for listening and holding sacred space? The Ministers of Care provide care and encourage the wider congregation to provide care for those in our congregation who are unable to regularly make it to worship, are in need of additional connection and support, or are going through a major life transition.

Grounds care in spring, summer, and fall requires mowing the church lawn, in addition to the church garden lot adjacent to the alley, prior to Sunday's worship (Thursday, Friday, or Saturday). In the winter it's a little different. Sign up for a whole week - Monday-Sunday - and if it snows, you "win" what is affectionately

called the snow lottery. You've got to clear the walkways with the church snow blower.

Tending God's Light

There are so many ways that we are all still, under our skin, adolescents. Delaying gratification, or planning for a possible future, or thinking beyond our own needs seem to be traits difficult to cultivate. Are we hardwired for not being able to see beyond the tip of our nose so that even planning can be a struggle? Which bridesmaid in this familiar and iconic tale from Matthew's Gospel are you? Would you remember to bring extra oil? Would you be ready for the night to fall? Or would you be left in the dark and unable to greet the bridegroom?

When psychologists test for how some people have developed the ability to delay gratification, they notice that those who are able to imagine a pleasant outcome to their choice—rather than thinking of it simply in terms of what they are giving up—are more likely to postpone one thing for something greater. Saving is about remembering what it is you are saving for rather than how little you have for now. Another way of saying that is this: we should think about today so that there will be a better future for ourselves and others.

If the Gospel is about nothing else it is about hope. Hope in a better world and in the genuine compassionate nature of human beings that a fully human Christ makes possible. Hope is a gift from us to the future. But only if we make that hope tangible and not just a dream we embroider on a cushion. What is it we need to do, and to what do we need to give so that the future will receive its gift from us? Who will benefit from the gift or pledge we make today? Who will receive it?

These are the things we might ask ourselves as we prepare our offering to the church of Jesus Christ. What will your church mean to the future? What do you imagine that future to be?

How will what you give today manifest itself for those who will be members of this church or residents of your town years from now? It's not what you give up, it's what you give to.

Those bridesmaids were split between those who imagined the future and those who did not.

They saw the connection between what they did today and what might happen tomorrow. Isn't that one of the things that is a sign of maturity? Be a mature bridesmaid and give to your church. The future is asking.
